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Course Description

4820. Seminar in Philosophy. Study in depth of a particular philosopher, topic, or area in philosophy, as determined by the instructor; may be repeated with different course content. Prereq.: One 3700-level PHIL course. 3 s.h.

In this seminar we will examine the history of free speech along with the arguments for and against the what is often termed the "absolutist" position. Although most people acknowledge the value of free speech, there is disagreement as to whether there are morally (and possibly legally) justifiable limits that may be place on certain types of speech, e.g., hate speech.
